The ASMS annual business meeting will be held at 5:00 pm in the Little Theater of the Convention Center and is open to all

members.

Major items of business on the agenda include election of 1986 Officers and one Member-at-Large on the Board of Trustees; election of three members to the Nominating Committee; ratification of proposed revisions to the Constitution and Bylaws; and reports of the Officers and committees. Nominations for any office or position will be accepted from the floor provided the prior consent of the person being nominated has been obtained.

In addition the Membership Committee is

proposing a number of applicants for election to membership in the organization. According to the Bylaws voting is limited to Active and Senior Members.

Discussion items include an action plan for seeking representation in the AMA House of Delegates and a report of the ad hoc Forward Planning Committee.

## Hugo H. Obwegeser, MD, DMD, To Give Kazanjian Lecture

The 1985 Kazanjian Honorary Lecture will be given by Hugo H. Obwegeser, MD, DMD, Zurich, Switzerland. Professor Dr. Obwegeser is director of the Kieferchirurgische Klinik of Universitätsspitals Zurich. His topic will be "What is Maxillofacial Surgery?" The Kazanjian Lecture will be given at 8:30 a.m., Tuesday, Oct. 29 in Scientific Session B.

Professor Dr. Obwegeser received his medical degree from the University of Innsbruck, Austria, in 1945 and his dental degree from the University of Graz, Austria, in 1949. He received specialization training in oral and maxillofacial surgery from 1949 to 1954 at the University of Graz. Additional training occurred in London and Stuttgart.

Professor Dr. Obwegeser has served as President of the European Association for Maxillofacial Surgery, Swiss Society of Maxillofacial Surgery, and German Society for Oral and Maxillofacial Surgery. He received the Distinguished Civilian Service Award from the U.S. Department of the Army. He was given the First Award of Excellence in Oral and Maxillofacial by the University of Texas, Southwestern Medical School. Professor Dr. Obwegeser is a Foreign Member of ASMS.

He has published more than 130 papers. This year marks the 10th anniversary of the Kazanjian Lecture which is sponsored by the American Society of Maxillofacial Surgeons. It honors Dr. Varaztad Kazanjian who was President of ASMS in 1949. Dr. Kazanjian was honored by American Society of Plastic and Reconstructive Surgeons in 1951 for his work in World War I. The lecture rotates each year with the Waldron Honorary Lectureship.

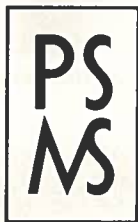

and Bylaws, and a listing of candidates for membership. By allowing members to be apprised of major agenda items prior to the annual meeting, these items may appropriately be reviewed and voted upon at the annual meeting. Comments either favorable or unfavorable on agenda items may be sent to the Board of Trustees prior to the annual meeting.

All ASMS activities in Kansas City will occur on Tuesday, Oct. 29 and a schedule is included in this publication. In addition an update on the Society's pursuit of delegate status within the American Medical Association is reported.

Future issues of *Maxillofacial News* will carry reports on activities of the Board, committees and members on a quarterly basis, replacing periodic presidential letters and other methods used for communication.

During my presidential year, I have had the pleasure of representing the American Society of Maxillofacial Surgeons at meetings of both the French and German maxillofacial societies. The French Society met April 25-27 in Nancy, France under the presidency of Dr. Jacques Dautrey. Primary topics addressed were orthognathic surgery of the jaw, surgery of the palate and the chin and of the cervico-facial profile.

In addition, practical operative sessions were held on a limited basis at Dr. Dautrey's clinic in Nancy, allowing visiting physicians a unique opportunity. Dr. Dautrey has given courses at his private hospital for years and the quality of his work is internationally respected.

An inscribed silver cup was offered to the French Society in fraternity and with respect by the ASMS at the final banquet of the meeting. Dr. Paul Tessier was among other notables in attendance.

I also had the pleasure of representing the ASMS at the meeting of the German Society of Maxillofacial Surgeons held May 21-25 in Erlangen, West Germany under the presidency of Prof. Dr. Emil W. Steinhauser. A similarly inscribed silver cup was presented to the German Society.

Prof. Dr. Steinhauser's clinic in Erlangen was also visited. A 40-plus bed facility on two floors, it is somewhat representative of German maxillofacial academic centers. It has its own operating room, intensive care unit, X-ray lab, oral surgery and outpatient surgery facilities and included what we would consider to be an oral surgery department.

I would encourage ASMS members to attend international meetings of sister societies to gain a deeper appreciation of what could be done in our specialty. The exchange of information at international meetings and visits to centers such as those of Dr. Dautrey and Prof. Dr. Steinhauser can only benefit ASMS members. International exchanges further understanding between nations and create bonds of friendship with foreign

colleagues.

At the invitation of the American Society of Plastic and Reconstructive Surgeons, I represented the Maxillofacial Society at the ASPRS Government Relations Conference in Washington, DC in June. Ray A. Elliott Jr, MD, was also in attendance, representing ASMS as a member of the ASPRS Government Relations Committee. We gained an increased awareness of the role government plays in medicine and the importance of responding to issues which may affect our specialty.

The work, dedication and interest of many members has made this a good year for the American Society of Maxillofacial Surgeons. The post-graduate course in maxillofacial surgery was presented in Houston in June and will be presented again this month in Norfolk. Members have represented the Society at a number of meetings of other organizations.

A contract for management services with Plastic Surgery Management Services was accepted by the Board of Trustees, establishing a more favorable relationship with ASPRS than has existed in the past.

Interest in maxillofacial surgery continues to grow, membership in the Society is increasing, and we are planning for the future.

I thank you sincerely for the privilege of serving as President of the Society for this year.

## Delegate Status In AMA Sought

Although the Maxillofacial Society's request for delegate status within the American Medical Association was denied last fall, the Board of Trustees at its March meeting reaffirmed its decision to pursue a seat within the AMA House of Delegates. It is not uncommon for an organization to apply for representation once or even several times before delegate status is granted.

The ASMS will again submit formal application to the AMA, stating that maxillofacial surgery is a scientifically valid field of medicine not currently represented within the House of Delegates. The Maxillofacial Society wishes to actively participate in and contribute to organized medicine and its membership base allows a unique perspective from which to do so.

Maxillofacial surgery needs a direct voice into and the support of organized medicine. As a medical specialty, maxillofacial surgery is on the edge between the medical and dental professions.

ASMS members not currently members of the AMA are encouraged to join the AMA. When applying for representation, it is advantageous for an organization to demonstrate that a high percentage of its members are AMA members. Seventy-four percent of ASMS voting members are AMA members which is just slightly above average for medical organizations.

An action plan to involve members in lobbying efforts during the June 1986 AMA House of Delegates meeting in Chicago will be discussed at the ASMS annual business meeting in Kansas City.

## First Issue Of Maxillofacial News

## Revisions To Constitution and Bylaws Proposed

The Constitution and Bylaws have been studied extensively during the past few months and major revisions are proposed. The committee has used as its resources Dr. Landa's charge to the committee, a polling of the entire membership and the advice and counsel of the Chicago central office.

The proposed versions of the Constitution and Bylaws as printed herein incorporate concerns from these various resources, are more readable and address more specifically the needs of the Society. The proposed revisions have been approved by the Board of Trustees and will be voted upon by the membership at the annual business meeting in Kansas City.

Major revisions include:

#### CONSTITUTION

##### Article II

The year 1974 has been changed to 1947 correcting a misprint in the previous Constitution.

##### Article IV

The words "officers of the Society and the Board of Trustees" have been streamlined to "officers and the Board of Trustees of the Society."

##### Article V

Assistant Secretary and Assistant Treasurer have been added. The actual change had previously been incorporated in the Bylaws, but had not been added to the Constitution.

In addition, language has been added making the President-Elect and the Vice President

ineligible for successive terms and the Secretary, Assistant Secretary, Treasurer and Assistant Treasurer eligible for re-election but they may not serve more than three terms.

##### Article VI

The Board of Trustees now incorporates all officers, the three immediate Past Presidents, three Members-at-Large and the Historian.

This change was ratified by the membership in 1984 and is now included in the Constitution.

##### Article VIII

Revision makes the Constitution consistent with the Bylaws which indicate that the time and place of the annual meeting shall be decided upon by vote of the members upon recommendation by the Board.

##### Article IX

Wording has been revised, but the intent and content remain unchanged.

#### BYLAWS

##### Article I

*Section 1*—Changes have been made to reflect the present function of the annual meeting and to ensure that proper elections are held each year. A statement has been added regarding preparation and submission of manuscripts to the Journal.

*Section 5-6*—Wording has been revised, but the intent and content remain unchanged.

*Section 7*—Language has been changed to clarify who is responsible for payment of registration fees for guests.

##### Article II

*Section 1-2*—Minor wording changes have been made.

*Section 3*—A section has been added to ex-

plain the voting procedure at Board of Trustees meetings.

*Section 5*—The duties of the Board have been expanded to include the right to confer Senior status upon members who have met the criteria and *who request such status*.

##### Article III

*Section 3*—Senior Membership must be requested in writing to the Secretary.

*Section 4*—Language has been added requiring Foreign Members to be of high moral and ethical standing, matching the language of requirements for Active Members.

##### Article VI

*Section 1*—Wording has been changed to reflect the current dues structure. Reference to the administrative fee has been dropped since none currently exists.

Wording regarding dues has been revised since dues have not included the registration fee for several years.

*Section 2*—The registration fee shall be determined by the Board of Trustees rather than by the chairman of the Local Arrangements and Publicity Committee.

##### Article VIII

*Section 2*—The Assistant Secretary is named as chairman of the Membership Committee in accord with action taken at the 1984 annual business meeting.

*Section 3*—The immediate Past President is named as chairman of the Nominating Committee.

*Section 5*—The Local Arrangements and Publicity Committee has been decreased from six (6) members to a single presidential appointee.

# Proposed Constitution and Bylaws

*Section 8*—The number of members on the Medical Economics and Legislative Committee has been decreased to a single presidential appointee.

## Article XI

*Section 1*—Language has been added to bring the Bylaws up to date for application requirements for change to 501 (c) (3) tax status.

*Section 2*—Language has been added to ensure distribution of funds as required by the IRS for organizations such as ASMS.

## CONSTITUTION

### ARTICLE I

#### Name

The name of this organization shall be "THE AMERICAN SOCIETY OF MAXILLOFACIAL SURGEONS."

### ARTICLE II

#### Seal

The official seal of the Society shall consist of the first letters of the name of the Society, arranged as AS of MS. This shall be surrounded by the words "AMERICAN SOCIETY OF MAXILLOFACIAL SURGEONS—Founded 1947."

### ARTICLE III

#### Mission

The mission of the Society shall be to stimulate and advance knowledge of the science and art of maxillofacial surgery and thereby to improve and elevate the standard of practice of the specialty.

### ARTICLE IV

#### Government

The governance of the Society shall be entrusted to the officers and the Board of Trustees of the Society.

### ARTICLE V

#### Officers

The officers of the Society shall be: a President, a President-Elect, a Vice President, a Secretary, an Assistant Secretary, a Treasurer, and an Assistant Treasurer. The terms of all offices shall be for one year. The President, President-Elect and Vice President shall not be eligible for successive terms. The Secretary, Assistant Secretary, Treasurer and Assistant Treasurer may be re-elected but may not serve more than three successive terms.

### ARTICLE VI

#### Board of Trustees

The Board of Trustees shall be composed of the President, the President-Elect, the Vice President, the Secretary, the Assistant Secretary, the Treasurer, the Assistant Treasurer, the three immediate Past Presidents, three Members-at-Large and the Historian. The President shall serve on the Board for three (3) years immediately following his term as President.

One Member-at-Large shall be elected by the membership at each annual business meeting for a three year term. Members-at-Large shall serve staggered three (3) year terms. A Historian shall be appointed by the Board of Trustees every five (5) years for a five (5) year term and may be re-appointed.

### ARTICLE VII

#### Members

The members of the Society shall be surgeons of high moral and ethical standing and professional attainment, who hold both the MD and DDS or MDM degrees, or only the MD degree, and who fulfill the requirements as provided in the Bylaws.

### ARTICLE VIII

#### Meetings

The annual meeting of the Society shall be held at a time and place designated by vote of the membership upon recommendation of the Board of Trustees.

### ARTICLE IX

#### Amendment of the Constitution

*Section 1.* The Constitution may be altered, amended or repealed at any annual or special meeting of the Society by two-thirds ( $\frac{2}{3}$ ) of the vote cast by the Active and Senior Members present. Written notice of a proposed change with the recommendation of the Board of Trustees must be given to all Active and Senior Members of the Society at least thirty (30) days prior to the meeting at which the change will be voted upon.

*Section 2.* Amendment proposals may originate from the Constitution and Bylaws Committee, the Board of Trustees or an Active or Senior Member.

*Section 3.* Amendment proposals shall be submitted in writing to the Constitution and Bylaws Committee for review and recommendation. The Constitution and Bylaws Committee shall submit amendment proposals to the Board of Trustees with its recommendations.

### ARTICLE X

#### Suspension of the Constitution

The Constitution may be suspended at the annual business meeting or any special meeting of the membership by two-thirds ( $\frac{2}{3}$ ) of the vote cast by the Active and Senior Members present.

## BYLAWS

### ARTICLE I

#### Meetings—Annual

*Section 1.* The annual meeting shall be held each year at such time and place as may be designated by the membership upon the recommendation of the Board of Trustees. The annual meeting shall consist of the annual business meeting of the membership and scientific sessions. Active Members shall be required to attend one annual meeting every three (3) years.

The annual business meeting shall be for the purposes of election of officers; election of a Member-at-Large to the Board of Trustees; election of three members to the Nominating Committee; election of new members; receipt of annual reports of the officers, Trustees, and committees; and for the transaction of such other business as may properly come before the membership.

All scientific papers presented at the annual meeting shall be in final form for publication in the Society's official organ, *Plastic and Reconstructive Surgery*, and shall be delivered as directed by the journal Editor. After review by the Board of Editors, manuscripts selected for publication shall become the property of the journal of *Plastic and Reconstructive Surgery*. Those rejected will be returned to, and become the property of, the author.

#### Meetings—Special

*Section 2.* Special meetings of the membership shall be called by the President upon the written request of at least one-third ( $\frac{1}{3}$ ) of the voting membership or at least four (4) members of the Board of Trustees. The request for a special meeting shall specify the business for which the meeting is to be called. Such meetings shall be held at a time and place designated by the President within sixty (60) days of receipt of the request.

#### Meetings—Notice

*Section 3.* A written notice stating the place, day and time of all meetings of the membership, annual and special, shall be mailed to each member at least thirty (30) days prior to the date of the meeting. Notification of a special meeting shall include the purpose for which the meeting is being called.

At any meeting, of which due notice has been given, a special meeting may be called by a two-thirds ( $\frac{2}{3}$ ) vote of the membership present without adherence to the thirty day notification requirement.

#### Quorum

*Section 4.* Twenty-five (25) percent of the Active and Senior Membership shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business at any meeting of the Society.

#### Vote

*Section 5.* All business meetings of the Society are open to Active, Senior, Honorary and Foreign Members but only Active and Senior Members shall have the right to vote.

A decision-making process for matters not addressed in these Bylaws shall be decided by a majority vote of the Active and Senior Members present at a meeting.

Voting may be by voice, by show of hands, by rising or by written ballot. Written ballot shall be used for the election of officers, election of members, changes to the Constitution and Bylaws, and any action relating to disciplinary proceedings against a member.

# Proposed Constitution and Bylaws

A written or closed ballot may be requested by any member upon any matter brought before the Society.

*Section 6.* The annual business meeting of the Society shall include approval of the minutes of the last annual business meeting and any special meetings held since the last annual business meeting; reports of the Board of Trustees, officers, standing and special committees; old business; new business; and election of new members, officers, a Member-at-Large to the Board of Trustees and the Nominating Committee.

## Guests

*Section 7.* Any member desiring to have a guest attend the annual meeting must so notify the Secretary within a reasonable period prior to the annual meeting. Upon notification the Secretary shall extend an invitation to the said guest. Either the sponsor or the guest shall assume the registration fee.

The chairman of the Scientific Program Committee may invite as guests members of the staff of hospitals, medical schools and dental schools with which local members are affiliated. Either the sponsor or the guest(s) shall assume the registration fee.

Guests invited specifically by the Society shall not be responsible for the registration fee.

## Parliamentary Authority

*Section 8.* Except as otherwise provided by the Constitution and Bylaws, meetings of the Society shall be governed by the current edition of *Sturgis Standard Code of Parliamentary Procedure*.

## ARTICLE II

### Board of Trustees Meetings

*Section 1.* The regular annual meeting of the Board of Trustees shall precede the annual business meeting of the membership. The President may whenever he deems it expedient, and shall whenever requested to do so by at least two (2) members of the Board of Trustees, call a special meeting of the Board. The President shall specify in such a call the time, place and purpose of the meeting. Notice of all meetings of the Board shall be mailed to each Trustee at least twenty (20) days prior to the meetings. Such notice may be waived by the unanimous consent of the Trustees.

### Quorum

*Section 2.* A majority of the fourteen (14) member Board of Trustees shall constitute a quorum. If necessary, however, a quorum may be declared by the President for transaction of business.

### Voting

*Section 3.* Each member shall have one vote. Voting shall be in person and shall not be delegated nor exercised by proxy.

## Officers

*Section 4.* The President of the Society shall act as chairman of the Board of Trustees and the Secretary of the Society shall act as Secretary of the Board.

## Duties

*Section 5.* The Board of Trustees shall have the power to act as the executive body of the Society. It shall supervise, control and direct the business and affairs of the Society, its committees and publications; shall determine its policies, which shall be recorded in an official policy manual; shall actively promote its purposes; and shall supervise the investment and disbursement of its funds. The Board of Trustees may adopt such rules and regulations for the conduct of the Society's affairs as it deems necessary or advisable to best protect the interests and welfare of the Society.

The Board shall act as an appellate body for matters pertaining to the misconduct of members and violations of the three (3) year attendance rule. The Board shall take appropriate action as provided in Article VIII of the Bylaws.

The Board shall review the credentials of all individuals proposed for membership by the Membership Committee and make recommendations to the membership.

The Board shall confer Senior Member status on Active Members who have reached the age of sixty-five (65) years or who have been members of the Society for twenty-five (25) years and who so request. Senior Membership status may be conferred by the Board on Active Members who do not meet the above criteria but who have retired from active practice. Under special circumstances and at its discretion, the Board of Trustees may confer Senior Membership upon Active Members who so request but have not fully retired from active practice.

The Board shall receive and review proposed amendments to the Constitution and Bylaws and present written recommendations to the membership at least (30) days prior to the meeting of the membership.

*Section 6.* Members of the Board of Trustees who resign as officers of the Society automatically resign from the Board. Their successors become members of the Board.

*Section 7.* Vacancies for the balance of the term of any Trustee shall be filled by the Board of Trustees, except those who become Trustees by virtue of their election to office shall be replaced by their successor to the office.

## ARTICLE III Membership

*Section 1.* Membership in the Society shall be by invitation only. The Society shall have the following classes of members: (a) Active, (b) Senior, (c) Foreign and (d) Honorary Members.

## Active

*Section 2.* Active Members shall be surgeons of high moral and ethical standing who are actively engaged in the practice of maxillofacial surgery and who are citizens of, and reside in, the United States or Canada.

Completion of five (5) years of recognized graduate training in preparation for maxillofacial surgery, acceptable to the Society, after obtaining the MD degree, shall be a prerequisite for Active Membership.

To be considered for Active Membership, an individual must be proposed in writing and seconded by any Active or Senior Members, one of whom must be from the same community as the individual, or if no member resides in his community, from his territory. The proposer shall send the Membership Chairman a curriculum vitae which shall include the name, address, education, formal training, hospital affiliation with official titles together with such other information as may be pertinent.

The Membership Chairman shall invite the individual to the annual meeting of the Society. No individual may be considered for Active Membership without having attending at least one annual meeting.

Following attendance at an annual meeting, the Membership Chairman shall send an application to the individual for completion. The completed application must be returned with certification of training and a certified listing of all operations performed within the previous twelve months. The Membership Committee shall review the application and credentials of applicants and make recommendations on membership to the Board of Trustees. Individuals approved by the Board shall be submitted to the membership at the next annual meeting. Election of individuals to Active Membership shall be by affirmative vote of three-quarters (¾) of the Active and Life Members casting ballots.

## Senior

*Section 3.* Senior Membership shall be conferred by the Board of Trustees upon request to all Active Members who have reached the age of sixty-five (65) years or who have been members of the Society for at least twenty-five (25) years. Members eligible for Senior Membership shall submit a written request for elevation of status to the Secretary who shall present the request to the Board. Senior Membership may also be conferred by the Board upon Active Members who do not meet the above requirements but who have retired from active practice and who so request. Under special circumstances and at its discretion, the Board of Trustees may confer Senior Membership upon Active Members who so request but have not fully retired from active practice.

Senior Members shall be exempt from payment of dues, but shall assume the registra-

tion fee when attending meetings. Senior Members shall enjoy all privileges of the Society including the right to vote, serve on committees and hold office.

## Foreign

*Section 4.* Foreign Members shall be surgeons of high moral and ethical standing from outside the territorial limits of the United States and Canada who are actively engaged in the practice of maxillofacial surgery.

To be considered for Foreign Membership, an individual must be proposed in writing by an Active or Senior Member. The proposer shall send the Membership Chairman a curriculum vitae which shall include the name, address, education, formal training, hospital affiliation with official titles together with such other information as may be pertinent.

The Membership Chairman shall invite the individual to the annual meeting of the Society. No individual may be considered for membership without attending at least one annual meeting.

Following attendance at an annual meeting, the Membership Chairman shall send an application to the individual for completion. The Membership Committee shall review the application and credentials of applicants and make recommendations on Foreign Membership to the Board of Trustees. Individuals approved by the Board shall be submitted to the membership at the next annual meeting. Election of individuals to Foreign Membership shall be by affirmative vote of four-fifths (4/5) of the Active and Life Members casting ballots.

Foreign Members shall pay an initiation fee, but shall not be required to pay dues or to observe the three-year attendance rule. They shall assume the registration fee when attending meetings. They shall enjoy all the privileges of the Society except those of voting and holding office.

## Honorary

*Section 5.* Honorary Members shall be surgeons who have distinguished themselves in the field of maxillofacial surgery.

The name and credentials of an individual may be proposed by an Active or Life Member to the Board of Trustees for consideration for Honorary Membership. The Board may recommend the proposed individual to the membership for Honorary Membership status. An individual proposed for Honorary Membership shall be considered elected if all votes cast by Active and Senior Members are affirmative with no more than a total of five (5) negative votes being cast.

Honorary Members shall not be required to pay an initiation fee nor dues nor observe the three-year attendance rule. They shall enjoy all privileges of the Society except those of voting and holding office.

## ARTICLE IV

*Section 1.* Officers shall be elected by the membership at the annual business meeting of the Society and shall serve until their successors have been elected or appointed.

*Section 2.* In the event of a vacancy occurring in any of the elective offices for any reason, the Board of Trustees may appoint a successor until the next annual meeting of the membership.

## ARTICLE V Duties of Officers

*Section 1. President.* The President shall preside at all meetings of the membership and of the Board of Trustees and have the right to vote. In the event of an equal vote on any question at any meeting of the members or Board of Trustees, the President shall cast the deciding vote. Subject to the Board of Trustees, the President: a) shall be the principal executive officer of the Society, b) shall have general charge and supervision of the affairs of the Society, c) shall appoint Standing Committees and appoint and charge special committees as he may deem necessary or proper, d) shall perform such other duties as may be prescribed by the Board of Trustees or as may be incident to his office, e) shall have the privilege of inviting non-Board members to meetings of the Board of Trustees for special advice and consultation as he deems necessary, f) shall be an ex-officio member of all committees with the right to vote on all committees except the Nominating Committee and the Membership Committee.

*Section 2. President-Elect.* The President-Elect shall perform such duties as may be prescribed by the Board of Trustees. He shall be an ex-officio member of all Standing Committees. The President-Elect becomes the President when the latter's term expires.

*Section 3. Vice President.* The Vice President shall be responsible for such duties as are assigned to him by the President with the approval of the Board of Trustees. The Vice President shall be vested with all of the powers and shall perform all of the duties of the President in the event of the latter's inability to act.

*Section 4. Secretary and Assistant Secretary.* Subject to the Board of Trustees, the Secretary: a) shall have general charge of the books, papers and records of the Society, b) shall maintain the minutes of the annual business meeting and the meetings of the Board of Trustees, c) shall have general charge of all correspondence, d) shall send out all notices of meetings of the membership and the Board of Trustees, e) shall notify all members of their status as Active, Senior, Foreign, or Honorary, and shall send out an annual membership roster, f) shall at each annual business meeting announce the names of all who have ceased to be members since the last annual meeting, g) shall at the direction of the Board of Trustees

have published and shall distribute the Constitution and Bylaws of the Society. The duties of the Assistant Secretary shall be as assistant to the Secretary in all matters of the office at the direction of the Secretary.

*Section 5. Treasurer and Assistant Treasurer.* Subject to the Board of Trustees, the Treasurer: a) shall have charge of the funds, receipts and disbursements of the Society, b) shall collect all dues, fees and other demands owing to the Society, c) shall keep full and accurate books of accounts, showing receipts and disbursements, d) shall sign all checks and orders for the payment of money, and shall invest funds of the Society as the Board of Trustees shall direct, e) shall make a full report of the financial affairs of the Society at each annual meeting, f) shall perform such other duties as may be prescribed by the Board of Trustees or as may be incident to his office. The duties of the Assistant Treasurer shall be as assistant to the Treasurer on all matters of the office at the direction of the Treasurer.

## ARTICLE VI Dues and Assessments

*Section 1.* Each Active and Foreign Member shall pay an initiation fee at the beginning of the first fiscal year following acceptance into membership. In addition, each Active Member shall pay annual dues as determined by the Board of Trustees. All amounts due shall be payable in United States currency and shall be applicable to the payment of the general expenses of the Society. An assessment may be made if deemed necessary by the Board of Trustees and ratified by the membership.

*Section 2.* The registration fee for all categories of membership at the annual scientific meeting shall be determined by the Board of Trustees.

*Section 3.* The fiscal year shall begin on January 1st of each year.

## ARTICLE VII Standing Committees

*Section 1.* The following Standing Committees shall function in the Society: Membership, Nominating, Constitution and Bylaws, Scientific Program, Local Arrangements and Publicity, Auditing, Medical Economics and Legislative, Continuing Medical Education, and Research.

### Membership Committee

*Section 2.* The Membership Committee shall consist of three (3) Active or Senior Members, one of whom shall be the Assistant Secretary who shall serve as the chairman. The President shall appoint the other two members of the committee. The Secretary shall be an ex-officio member of the committee. The Membership Committee shall obtain and review the applications and credentials of all individuals to be considered for Active

and Foreign Membership. Before recommending any individual for membership, the committee shall be satisfied by proof deemed to be sufficient by it that the individual has complied with the laws of his state, country or province relative to the practice of medicine, and that such individual is of good moral and professional character, standing, and reputation, and that his admission would serve the best interests of the Society. The Membership Committee shall submit the data assembled by it together with its recommendation to the Board of Trustees for approval or disapproval. If approved, the name of the individual is submitted to vote by the membership at the annual business meeting for elevation to membership.

The Membership Committee shall maintain records of membership attendance at the annual meeting and report violations of the three year attendance rule to the Board of Trustees.

## Nominating Committee

*Section 3.* The Nominating Committee shall consist of five (5) Active or Senior Members. Three (3) of the members shall be elected by the membership at the annual business meeting; the fourth member shall be appointed by the Board of Trustees and the fifth member shall be the immediate Past President who shall serve as chairman of the committee. It shall be the duty of the Nominating Committee to select candidates for the elected offices and the Member-at-Large Board position and to present this slate to the membership at least thirty (30) days prior to the annual business meeting.

## Constitution and Bylaws Committee

*Section 4.* The Constitution and Bylaws Committee shall consist of three (3) Active or Senior Members appointed by the President. It shall be the duty of the Constitution and Bylaws Committee to receive suggestions and initiate proposals for the alteration or amendment of the Constitution and Bylaws. The Committee shall submit proposals to the Board of Trustees which shall study proposals and submit its recommendations to all Active and Senior Members of the Society.

## Scientific Program Committee

*Section 5.* The Scientific Program Committee shall consist of four (4) members appointed by the President. One of the members shall be the Local Arrangements Appointee. It shall be the duty of this committee to arrange the scientific program for the annual meeting.

## Local Arrangements and Publicity Appointee

*Section 6.* The President shall appoint a member who shall be responsible for local arrangements for the annual meeting. He shall release information concerning the Soci-

ety and the scientific program to various communications media making certain that all publicity is handled in an ethical manner.

## Auditing Committee

*Section 7.* The Auditing Committee shall consist of three (3) members appointed by the President. It shall be the duty of this committee to conduct an annual audit of the accounts, receipts, disbursements and other financial transactions of the Society.

## Medical Economics and Legislative Appointee

*Section 8.* The President shall appoint a member to consider matters dealing with the social, economic and legislative aspects of medical practice which may be of concern to maxillofacial surgeons.

## Continuing Medical Education Committee

*Section 9.* The Continuing Medical Education Committee shall consist of four (4) members appointed by the President. The chairman of the Continuing Medical Education Committee of the American Society of Plastic and Reconstructive Surgeons shall be invited to serve on the committee as a consultant. It shall be the duty of this committee to plan and designate accredited post-graduate activities for the Society and its members in order to qualify for and maintain active participation in approved continuing medical education programs of the American Medical Association. The committee will coordinate its activities with the Continuing Medical Education Committee of the American Society of Plastic and Reconstructive Surgeons.

## Research Committee

*Section 10.* The Research Committee shall consist of four (4) members appointed by the President. It shall be the duty of the committee to encourage and serve in an advisory capacity for research projects carried on by members of the Society.

## Rules for Committees

*Section 11.* Each committee shall present a written report to the Board prior to the annual meeting. The Board shall submit written summaries of committee activities to the membership. A majority of the committee shall constitute a quorum.

## ARTICLE VIII

### Rules Governing Violation of Membership

*Section 1.* Any Active Member who does not attend an annual meeting of the Society for three (3) successive years, may, on the recommendation of the Board of Trustees and by majority vote of the members present at an annual business meeting, be stricken from the membership roll unless evidence of mitigating circumstances is submitted in writing to the Secretary.

*Section 2.* Should any member or members make written complaint to the Secretary specifically charging a member, officer or Trustee with misconduct affecting either the Society or the member's reputation as an honorable surgeon, the Board of Trustees shall investigate such charges in a meeting at which the accused shall be entitled to appear. If the charges are found to be warranted, the Board of Trustees shall report its findings and recommendations to the membership for final decision and disciplinary action in a duly called meeting of the members at which the accused shall also be entitled to appear.

## ARTICLE IX

### Amendment of the Bylaws

*Section 1.* The Bylaws may be altered, amended or repealed at any annual or special meeting of the Society by a two-thirds ( $\frac{2}{3}$ ) vote of the members present, providing written notice of proposed change(s) with the recommendation of the Board of Trustees has been given to all Active and Senior Members at least thirty (30) days prior to the meeting.

*Section 2.* A proposed amendment may originate from the Constitution and Bylaws Committee, the Board of Trustees or an Active or Senior Member.

*Section 3.* Any proposed amendment shall be filed in writing with the Constitution and Bylaws Committee which shall study the proposal and submit it to the Board of Trustees with its recommendations.

## ARTICLE X

### Suspension of the Bylaws

The Bylaws may be suspended at any annual or special meeting of the Society by an affirmative vote by ballot of two-thirds ( $\frac{2}{3}$ ) of the vote cast.

## ARTICLE XI

### Termination of the Society

*Section 1.* The Society shall use its funds only to accomplish the purposes specified in these Bylaws. No part of said funds shall inure to the benefit of, or be distributed to, any member of the Society.

In the event of dissolution of the Society, the Board of Trustees shall, after paying or making provision for the payment of all liabilities of the Society, distribute the remaining assets to such organization(s) operated for one or more of the purposes contained in the Articles of Incorporation and the Bylaws of the Society, or to such charitable, educational, or scientific organization(s) as shall qualify as exempt under SECTION 501 (c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code of the United States, as amended.
